## Attendance

As we have reached the 30th day of school both Spaulding and McAlister communicated with all families where a student had three or more absences. All absences (excused and unexcused) are included in our reporting. We recognize that we continue to be in unique circumstances where students stay home if they present with symptoms potentially related to COVID-19. We continue to document reasons for all absences but are obligated to report absence numbers regardless of the reason. As per our BOE policy chronic absenteeism is defined as:

Chronically absent child: An enrolled student whose total number of absences at any time during a school year is equal to or greater than ten percent of the total number of days that such student has been enrolled at such school during such school year.

Absence: An excused absence, unexcused absence or disciplinary absence, as those terms are defined by the State Board of Education pursuant to C.G.S. 10-198b.

District chronic absenteeism rate: The total number of chronically absent children in the previous school year divided by the total number of children under the jurisdiction of the Board of Education for such school year.

## One Book One School

We are thrilled to have celebrated our One Book, One School together as a school community this past week. We had opportunities to share our class PowerPoint presentations where we learned about one another's cultures and traditions.

## Band

Lessons began several weeks ago. Every student has had at least one lesson - some have had two or three depending on the day of the week their lesson occurs. All students have received at least one at-home assignment to complete in Flipgrid through our Google Classroom page listed under the Classwork tab.

Parents often ask how many minutes their child should be practicing each day/week. The answer is different for every child and may vary from week to week. Each week at your child's lesson we will learn a concept or skill and create a goal for the week. Some students will be successful at reaching our goal by practicing only a couple of times that week. Others may need to practice a little every day to be successful at the same goal. What may be a more simple goal one week, another week may be more complicated and need additional time devoted in order to achieve success.

When learning something new, like an instrument, I always suggest doing it a little bit every day goes a lot further than trying to practice a lot of minutes only once a week. Playing an instrument needs to become a muscle memory - your child will be most successful by practicing our skills and concepts frequently, even if only for a few minutes each time, and using the videos I post on Flipgrid as a guide when we are not together to practice.

Finally, please remind your child that there are no playing instruments on the bus and instruments should remain closed and latched throughout the bus ride for safety purposes.

## Final Mile, Physical Education

Congratulations to all of our Final Mile Participants. They did an outstanding job this year!! Together they ran 1052 miles in 27 days!

## Accomplishments include the following:

- 4 Students earn their 5 K tokens ( 3.1 miles)
- 5 Students earn their 10K tokens ( 6.2 miles)
- 17 Students earn their Half Marathon tokens ( 13.1 miles)
- 19 Students earn their Full Marathon tokens ( 26.2 miles)
- 2 Students earn their Ultramarathon which is 50 Miles!!!

On Friday, October 22nd, students will run their "Final Mile" to celebrate their success this season. The students that completed their Half or Full Marathon (or Ultra) received their Finishers Medal.

## Preschool:

Preschool continues to learn about our similarities and differences through our All About Me unit. Students are identifying body parts, drawing self-portraits, comparing ourselves to others, and soon we will talk about our 5 senses. We are revisiting our health and safety lessons as we enter the cold season. Students are reviewing hand washing practices, walking at a safe distance in line, keeping our masks on, and coughing/sneezing into our elbows. Our Math curriculum is using pumpkins in October to teach the life cycle, counting, patterning, and concepts like longer/shorter, bigger/smaller, and lighter/heavier.

Recently, the preschoolers enjoyed a visit from Captain Ron and the Suffield Fire Department! We learned to call 911 in an emergency, what a firefighter looks like in his uniform, how a smoke detector sounds, what different parts of the truck include, and how to Stop, Cover Your Face, Drop, and Roll if your clothes catch on fire. ## Reading Identities: We are all readers!

We are a community of readers! Thank you to all of the families, staff and students for sharing who they are as readers. Our school is filled with so many identities. We celebrated the importance of reading during a school assembly on 10/7/21. See some of the highlights below:


## Number Talks:

Number Talks is a strategy developed by Ruth Parker \& Kathy Richardson to help teach number sense and math facts. Number Talks is a strategy that keeps students engaged as peers share various methods for solving the same problem. Students are able to practice math fluency, develop conceptual understanding of numbers, and learn arithmetic properties. The following steps are conducted:

1. The teacher poses an abstract math problem.
2. The teacher asks students to solve it mentally, providing wait time and silent cues for students to use when they have at least one method and solution.
3. The teacher collects the different solutions (not including methods at this time).
4. The teacher selects students to share their strategies with the group and will write them on the board.
5. The class discusses the accuracy and efficiency of each method. Parents can incorporate this strategy into their discussions with children. Here are some suggestions:
6. Ask your child to explain the method they used to solve a problem.
7. Ask your child to try to solve the same problem using another method.

## Fire Prevention:

The preschool and Kindergarten students learned about fire prevention and safety from our very own Suffield Fire Department. Students learned important information and then got to see and explore a real fire truck! A huge thank you to our Suffield Fire Department for partnering with Spaulding School.
